Suicide in Maine - 2018 Update

A Data Brief: YOUTH (Ages 10-24)

SUICIDE DEATHS (2014-2016)¹

Each year, approximately 30 Maine youth die by suicide (88 total suicide deaths 2014-2016: ages 10-14: 3 deaths, ages 15-19: 37 deaths, and ages 20-24: 48 deaths.)



Suicide is the second leading cause of death among Maine youth ages 10-24:1




leading cause of death among Maine youth ages 10-14.




leading cause of death among 2nd Maine youth ages 15-19 and ages 20-24.

The suicide rate (2014-2016) among Maine youth ages 10-24 is higher than the U.S. rate:

12.6 vs 9.1 suicides per 100,000

SUICIDE ATTEMPTS (2013-2014)³

Emergency department visits due to intentional self-inflicted injury steadily, and significantly, increased since 2001. (Figure 1)

Average number of **emergency** department visits annually due to intentional self-inflicted injuries.

46%

of all intentional self-inflicted injury related emergency department visits among Maine youth were among those ages 15-19 years.

Hospital discharge rates due to intentional selfinflicted injuries were steady through 2012 but significantly increased in 2013. (Figure 1)

On average, there are 450 hospital discharges annually due to intentional self-inflicted injuries among Maine youth ages 10-24 years.

Girls are significantly more likely to be hospitalized due to intentional self-inflicted injuries than boys:





of all hospital discharges due to intentional self-inflicted injuries among Maine youth were among those ages 15-24 years.

SUICIDE METHODS (2014-2016)¹

Firearms are used in **47%** of all youth suicides; suffocation (including hanging/strangulation) accounts for **40%** of all youth suicides in Maine.

SUICIDE THOUGHTS & ATTEMPTS⁵

Suicidal thoughts and attempts are a concern among Maine students.

Among Maine high school students:

15%

seriously **considered suicide** in the past year.⁵ (Figure 2)

and

7%

attempted suicide in the past year.⁵

Among Maine middle school students:


16% ever seriously considered suicide⁵

and

6%

ever attempted suicide.⁵

DISPARITIES: Sex, Sexual Orientation, Transgender

Male youth are more likely to die by suicide than female youth. However, female youth are more likely to attempt suicide than male youth.

Suicide is 4x more likely among male youth than female youth. Males accounted for 81% of all Maine youth suicides in 2014-2016.¹

High school girls are significantly more likely to consider suicide than high school boys.⁵



Female youth have significantly higher rates of emergency department visits and hospitalization due to intentional self-inflicted injuries than male youth.²

High school students who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or unsure of their gender identity are more likely to consider and attempt suicide.

In 2017, **36%** of gay or lesbian and **43%** of bisexual Maine high school students reported suicidal thoughts in the past year compared to **11%** of heterosexual students.⁵

19% of gay or lesbian and **19%** of bisexual Maine high school students reported attempting suicide within the past year compared to **6%** of heterosexual students.⁵

54% of transgender Maine high school students reported suicidal thoughts within the past year compared to **14%** of non-transgender students.⁵
